

## **REMEMBERING TONY CARRASCO JR.**

On that grim 4<sup>th</sup> of November day, Soldiers from Bravo Battery, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion, 32<sup>nd</sup> Field Artillery sat around together at Patrol Base Woodcock and began to recall many of the fond memories that we have of CPL Tony Carrasco Jr.

Born on 11 February 1984 in Dona Ana, New Mexico to hardworking immigrant parents, many knew that Tony had a family back home – a wife and children that he loved dearly and would let anyone know about. Hearing him speak of his loved ones for hours and hours made you want to strive to love yours in the same manner – all one could do is stay mesmerized at how a man with such a short stature could possess such a giant heart. SSG John Steele, his section chief, eloquently

put it in the shortest amounts of words when he said, "Tony was the man we all wished we could be. If any of us become half the man he was, we will have led a great life."

The man possessed an internal work ethic that is far too uncommon these days, always putting his left foot forward and accomplishing any task put before him. He motivated his entire section to work as diligently as he did, and if they did not, he was sure to let them know in a way that drove the point home, but also possessed that unique Tony Carrasco humor. One such occasion, as it was told by PFC Patrick Darnell, another cannon crewmember in the same section, came on a live-fire exercise at Fort Riley, Kansas. The Battery was preparing for another day of fire missions and his section was moving a little sluggish with the normal gripes and complaints that came with the cold weather, early wake-up and lack of sleep. Tony was there to accomplish his tasks and then help others do theirs without a word being said. As the section continued to express their discontent, Tony said, with his unique humor, "Man, all of you would starve in Mexico." The way it was said, says PFC Darnell, made everyone laugh, but also inspired them work



without complaints and their fullest capacity. This work ethic was highlighted by what SGT David Hart had to say about Tony: "CPL Carrasco lived by a creed that many of us live by today: no one is more professional than I. He was more than just a Soldier to me; he was my friend, my brother."

I was his platoon leader from the moment Tony came to us from Advanced Individual Training at Fort Sill, Oklahoma in June 2008. There are many stories I could recall that we shared, stories of hardworking immigrant parents, family values, the love for family, and dedication to those around us. Yet, I would never place myself on an equal level with Tony. Even though we shared these same traits, I would, as SSG Steele said, consider myself to be a great man if I led half the life he did. He left me with a great sense of accomplishment days before the tragedy happened when he said to me, "You're doing a great job." All I could do was walk up to him, rub on that infamously shaved head, and tell him how thankful I was for that comment, and how honored I was that it came from someone I admire and respect tremendously. He continued on to say, with his trademark smile, "Don't worry, we all love you." Those two simple phrases have inspired me and lifted me to places I never thought existed, and for that I am truly thankful.



It seems as though he led a life reserved for an elder with many, many years behind him; he possessed a wisdom that you could only hope to catch a glimpse of; most of all, he held a love that was larger than life itself. Whether it was in the boxing ring, working out, eating, or especially talking about his loved ones, Tony had the largest smile one could ever see, a smile that went from ear-toear. All of us in 1<sup>st</sup> Platoon and in the Battery will miss him dearly – a huge piece of our heart was taken away unjustly. I will miss him poking fun at me, or me telling him he was getting fat by eating all those Otis Spunkmeyer treats. We will miss his smile and amicable personality. Most of all, we Bulldogs will never forget just how truly great Tony Carrasco Jr was. We will continue to honor his name and legacy.

Until we meet again brother, thank you for giving us all the privilege of having known you. We love you always, and make sure you save us some food!

The months of November and December has remained steady with operations. First, we hope that everyone had wonderful holidays and we wish that we could've been there. Both months we spent conducting inventories on our Organizational and Theater Provided Equipment. Headquarters squared away all the paperwork that we needed to have a successful Change of Command. HQ refined their skills with the Company Intel Support Team (COIST) PFC Brooks and PFC Diaz work hard to keep the Soldiers of G Company up to date on the latest enemy activity and local national trends that we need to be aware of to stay safe. . On December 16th we said goodbye to a member of our family, 1SG John Ruiz. He has spent three years in the 1SG position at G Company and has had a tremendous

impact on everyone that has passed through his ranks. In his place, we gain a new member of the Gladiator family, 1SG Christopher Long, his wife Melissa, and daughter Samantha. 1SG Long was serving as the Battalion Operations Sergeant for 2-32 FA.

Over the last month we have contributed to a historical time period in Operation Iraqi Freedom by closing down Patrol Base Woodcock. We have retrograded over \$42 million of equipment, which has taken long hours for Distribution Platoon. We were able to bring back all equipment without loss or damage. Unfortunately this month we had our first encounter with an Improvised Explosive Devise (IED). The IED was very small, no one was hurt, and there was minimal damage done to the vehicles. Distro also picked up a new mission, to support the Provincial Joint Coordination Center (PJCC). We will not be Sending Soldiers to live at the PJCC, just delivering supplies and personnel to and from the forward location. We want to spotlight on a unique aspect of the missions that Distro conducts. Birthdays:

The Renegade Scouts Weapons Team (SWT) has partnered with Distro Platoon during numerous missions conducted this month. The SWT typically consists of at least 2 Kiowa attack helicopters equipped with weapons systems including hellfire missiles. Having these "Renegades" watching out for us helps Distro feel a little more at ease on the roads.

Maintenance has continued to service the batteries' equipment superbly. Once Woodcock closed that added Bravo battery to their weekly regeneration schedule. The PLL clerks have turned \$2.5 million worth of excess equipment back into the Army supply system. This is higher than any other unit in the Brigade. Although Woodcock has closed, we are maintenance is still supporting the JCC, and CPL Thomas and SGT Annis has taken over operations out there. They provide recovery assets in Tikrit in case vehicles break down on mission. The welding section (SPC Bateast, and PFC Zellaha) has taken on the task of creating a memorial project for CPL Carrasco.

CPL Thomas, SPC Preston and SPC Strnad attended the NCO/Soldier of the Month Board in which SPC Frank Strnad was selected as Soldier of the Month for November. Maintenance also got a very unique type of training this month, tazer training. Over the last few weeks, Detainee mission has been tasked to Maintenance, headed up by 2LT Garvin. They have been permitted to carry tazers, but in order to carry one, they must first be tazed by one. That is enough pain to make grown men cry!


